Jane Miller

I would like to teach at the Young Writers Institute because I have a passion for finding ways to encourage authentic writing with students of all ages. I have been a high school English and journalism teacher as well as a professional writer.

Based on my experience of interviewing young writers for an article with the Pittsburgh Tribune Review, I have high expectations and respect for their abilities. I view the typical young writer as creative and often with a definite vision for the type of writing they prefer, usually within fictional or poetic genres.

As both a professional journalist and adviser to high school newspaper and yearbook programs, I would like to expand their visions by sharing ways to think and write creatively as a nonfiction writer. I would like to teach skills that have practical applications right now within their schools and communities.

I have worked collaboratively as a teacher since my early years of teaching going back to the 1980's. As a middle school and high school yearbook advisor for seven years, I had a great deal of experience in collaborative teaching. Often my students interacted with teachers on news beats in order to anticipate future publication coverage. Currently, I co-teach the AIU3 Act 48 class "Words + Pictures," with Black Hawk middle school teacher Leslie Kunkel. We encourage collaboration among art and classroom teachers, as well.

As a teacher—as well as an ongoing student, myself—of writing, I value the time that is spent one-on-one with other writers who become readers and listeners to each others' work. Writing, I believe, is more "caught," than taught, and encouragement is a great part of the process. As a teacher in the Young Writer's Institute, I hope that I could share my passion for helping students discover the amazing stories that surround each one of them, and encourage them to use those stories in a variety of genres.

Lesson #1 Idea: The Art and Craft of Writing a "Bio"

All of our lives we will be crafting brief stories about who we are for print and internet media. A session on writing a brief biography could be adapted for all ages of young writers, with varying parameters. The art of writing a good bio is the same as good writing, with lots of verbs and a bit of the unexpected to make it interesting. The craft is the construction that fits the publication format and conveys the essence of "who" this person is. Part of the craft is the organization, and developing a form that can be used for a school's publications where bios are used, ranging from yearbook to musical theater programs. A variation on this class could be to craft well-written "tweets."

Lesson #2 Idea: Create a children's picture book/storytelling

This could be a session that, again, could be geared towards the interest and grade levels of the students. In the "Words + Pictures" class I co-teach for AIU3, teachers are taught a "Keepsake" picture book graphic organizer technique that helps them brainstorm about stories in their lives that is expanded to a 1,000 word story with four illustrations. This class would share the elements of fiction writing, but geared towards the idea that in the final product, the illustrations and words share the story telling. This could be an on-going project that students finish independently, and share in a story telling session at the Oakland Library at a later date. A variation on this class could be in the art of storytelling and oral interpretation, too.
